



Whatever brings you to Manchester, a "Must See" is the historic **Amoskeag Millyard**, the greatest mill complex in all of North America (highlighted in purple on both banks of the Merrimack River). It is listed on the National Register of Historic Places. By the early 1900s, Manchester had become the world leader in textile manufacturing, employing 15,000 people, producing up to 600 miles of cloth in a day, and exporting world wide. Today it remains an exciting center for productive business and commercial activity.

Manchester provides an excellent model of 19th century urban planning. It features a thoughtful integration of manufacturing plants, river canals for power (filled in and used as roadways today), housing for employees, and a downtown center where people meet for shopping, dining, and entertainment.

Stroll along the **Riverwalk** and marvel at how this giant complex of brick buildings – more than a mile long – has adapted to the needs of modern society. For deeper insight, visit the nearby **Millyard Museum**, which opened in 2001. Continue on your journey and visit the many cultural landmarks of downtown Manchester, listed at the bottom of this page. 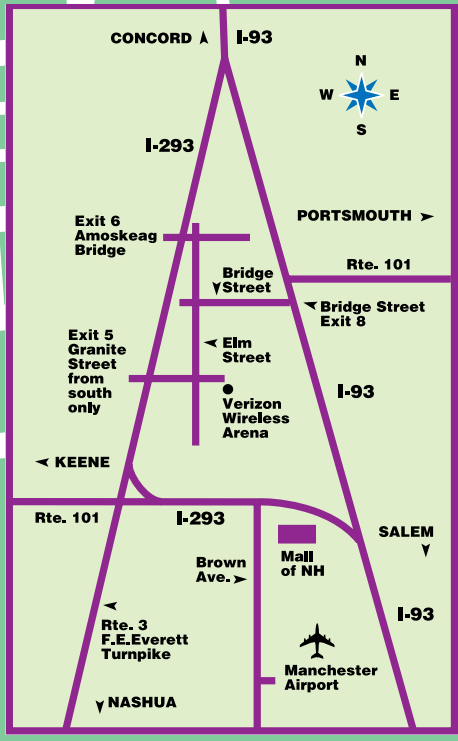
### PARKING

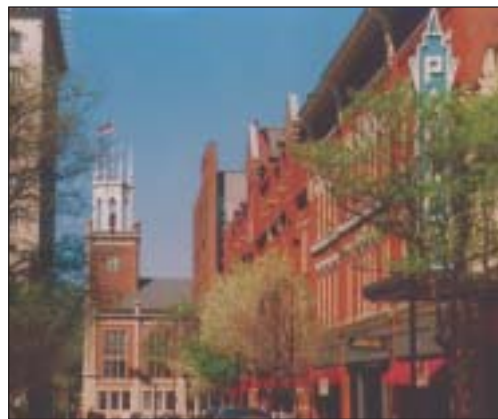
